# <u>Spring Garden Checklist</u>

This is a unique spring gardening season and I hope and pray it never happens again. Let's make the best of it by using the extra hours we have at home to improve what we have on hand and avoid trips to the hardware store or nursery.



- Clean and sharpen garden tools.
- Clean your rain gutters.
- Check and repair fencing while looking out for termites.
- Check pathways for tripping hazards and make necessary adjustments.
- Clear your garden of any debris.
- Prune bushes, ornamental grasses and fruit trees.
- Clean up and make repairs on garden décor. Use whatever outdoor paints you have on hand to freshen the colors.
- Using what you already have in your pile, compost your plants.
- Revitalize your compost heap with garden trimmings, unused fruit and veggie trimmings. Crumble up egg shells into the pile. Plant mint all around the heap to discourage rats.
- Troubleshoot your irrigation system, hoses and faucets.
- Clean and fill birdbaths, feeders.
- Insert stakes and supports for plants needing them.
- Plant whatever summer bulbs and seeds you already have on hand.
