June Garden Chores



- Harvest berries
- * Plant summer crops: tomatoes, corn, squash, peppers
- Grow sunflowers from seed
- Plant culinary herbs
- Plant mint in a separate pot
- Protect fruit trees with netting so birds and critters don't eat your crop
- Pinch back basil



Hints for Cutting Flowers

- Cut flowers in your garden in the early morning or evening.
- Pick flowers when they are just staring to show color.
 The exception is roses.
- Use a sharp knife. Avoid scissors.
- Place stems straight into a bucket of water.
- If possible leave the flower stems overnight in cool water before arranging.
- Keep flowers as cool as possible, but not in your fridge.
- Strip away any leaves below the water line of your vase.
- Use a vase big enough to provide plenty of room for the stems. A wide mouth makes for good air circulation.
- Cut the stems to a point if you are using floral foam.
- Check the water every day. Refresh when smelly or cloudy.
