- $\Diamond$ Gather fruit from your trees.
- Start preserving surplus veggies and fruits  $\Diamond$
- Start drying summer blooms. Your hot garage is a  $\Diamond$ perfect place.
- Remove spent veggies and compost them.  $\Diamond$
- Remove infected tomato plants. Destroy them,  $\Diamond$ don't add to compost.
- Dry herbs for winter dishes.  $\diamond$
- Harvest melons, sweet potatoes, berries.  $\Diamond$
- $\diamond$ Lightly prune blueberries and figs.
- Plant mums, marigolds, and zinnias.  $\Diamond$
- Prune hibiscus.  $\Diamond$
- Keep deadheading roses, and perennials  $\diamond$
- $\Diamond$ Refresh mulch.
