# September Garden Chores



- ♦ Herbs to plant as the weather cools: parsley, sage, rosemary, thyme, chives, lavender, cilantro, and mint
- ♦ Cooler weather veggies to plant: brussels sprouts, broccoli, green onions, cauliflower, lettuce, beans
- Trees and shrubs are best planted as the weather cools and they have time to grow roots before the heat returns (See p.3 for more information)
- Plant ground cover crops
- Protect ripening grapes from birds and other animals after your tasty crop
- Stop fertilizing and watering spent flowers and plants
- ♦ Clear out dead plants from your garden
- ♦ Add them to your compost pile
- ◆ Turn and dampen your compost
- Dry out the seeds from your favorite tomatoes and save them for next year

Unlike container-grown trees whose roots grow undisturbed in pots, <u>balled-and-burlapped</u> trees are dug from the field and their rootballs are wrapped in burlap to hold them together. The problem is, that this often cuts off most of the roots. If they survive, balled-and-burlapped trees just sit there for a couple of years after planting as they regrow their roots. Container-grown trees come with all of their roots and grow much faster after planting.
