Brydon Shares Gardening Knowledge With Girl Scouts

Scripps Ranch Troop 3631 asked our Garden Club for a talk about plants and Brydon Bennett answered the call.

The girls learned about how we can conserve our fresh water and how succulent plants conserve and store water in their roots, their stems or their leaves.

They then learned about the amazing properties of the *spekboom* plant, *Portulacaria afra*, including its hardiness, nutritional value, and ability to efficiently capture carbon from the atmosphere. They each planted a *spekboom* cutting to take home and grow.

- Tree And Shrub Transplant: You'll already know if any trees and shrubs are growing in less than ideal locations inside your garden. Now is the time to move them to more suitable locations.
- Plant bare-root trees.
- As long as the ground isn't frozen, you still have time to **get your soil tested**. Getting a soil test is the best way to **understand your soil** and prevent many plant problems.
- Give your lawn its last application of fertilizer this month after the last mowing for early green-up next spring. Apply 1/2-1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. Apply 1/2 pound if you've fed your lawn regularly this year, and 1 pound if you haven't or are trying to rehab a damaged lawn.

Minutes from the Meeting Oct.24,2023

To mark its 30th anniversary our club will assemble a Free Library kit filled with gardening books, placing it somewhere in this community, location to be researched.

The subject of our October 24th meeting was **Companion Planting** presented by Shital Parikh , a Master Gardener with a cornucopia (seasonal aside) of gardening expertise. Listing planting techniques with which we are already familiar: Amending soil throughout the year; No Till gardening; Crop Rotation, and Solarizing, she endorsed emerging research recommending **Companion Planting**. This is the placing of certain crops in proximity with certain other crops based on the possibility of benefiting pest control, pollination, attracting of beneficial insects, maximizing of space and increased crop yields.

One key to crop rotation is being able to characterize plants as "Heavy Feeders", the plants that take a lot of nutrients from the soil. "Heavy Givers", plants that give a lot in nutrient to the soil, and "Light Feeders". Key to Companion Planting is knowledge of plant families and how those families interact helpfully or not with other plant families.

Approximately 22 members were in attendance.
