Cooper's Hawk by Dave Fortner

This month we'll take a break from beneficial insect-eating birds and introduce the fierce-looking Cooper's Hawk. At 15-18 inches long with a wing-span of up to 3 feet (with the female being larger than the male), this medium-

sized hawk thrives in woodland and urban habitats. Look for the characteristic "T" or "cross shape" as they are zooming by. While they do eat small birds, they also eat small mammals so having them in your garden is natural pest control. We have seen our Cooper's Hawk swoop down from the fence and catch a large rat as well as him literally running around on the ground catching mice. Predators are essential in keeping their prey population healthy and alert. And please, please do not use poison to kill mice as this can kill their predators like hawks and owls who can eat a mouse a day, everyday.

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Compost - Turn and keep it moist.

Fertilize caneberries, citrus, deciduous fruit trees, palms, and heavily-flowering shrubs with slow-release product if not done in March.

Implement <u>disease and insect control</u> for apple, pear, stone fruits, nut trees, and deciduous landscape trees and shrubs such as roses.

<u>Mosquitoes</u> - Eliminate standing water e.g., in gutters, drain pipes, and flowerpots. Place *Bacillus thurin*-

giensis subspecies *israelensis* in birdbaths and ponds to selectively kill mosquito larvae.

<u>Mulch</u> - Apply organic mulch where thin or soil is bare beneath trees and shrubs.

<u>Peach leaf curl</u> - Apply preventive spray once or more during late fall through bud break if leaf curl has been a problem on nectarine or peach.

<u>Plant</u> bare root deciduous trees, shrubs, and vines e.g., caneberries, fruit and nuts, grapes, and roses. Plant California natives. Select species and cultivars well-adapted to the local site. Water regularly to keep root zone moist, but not soggy.

MINUTES of the March 25, 2025 Meeting

Scripps-Mesa Garden Club

Now that all of San Diego has been designated as "In the Fire Zone" this topic takes on an increasing urgency and encourages us to address the topic of defensible space and how that relates to gardening practices. Our speaker this evening, Cindy Brueks a 19 yr Master Gardener came prepared with an illustrated Fire safety video as well as A FIRE SAFETY CHECK LIST and the intention of threatening our complacency with notable facts.

Higher Average temperatures have increased both mega fires and mega winds in CA.

• A fire burns faster than firemen can fight it. It moves faster than they can outrun it.

Even concrete will burn if it gets hot enough.

• Attached wooden fences, if they burn up to the house, the whole house goes.

•Totally clear ZONE O: the first 6 feet from your house or decks

•Flying embers can travel 5.6 miles in the wind and are caught by eaves

•Optimum protection from embers and ash entering home comes with the use 1/8" METAL mesh grid on vents in your attic for example.

•Bushes close to the house burn quickly and take the house with them.

 \bullet Choose plants that accept water. Water when planted, then lightly

•Remove debris and all combustibles such as lawn furniture. Vinyl burns.

<u>Plant</u> frost-tender species e.g., avocado, bougainvillea, citrus, and hibiscus. Water regularly to keep root zone moist, but not soggy.

<u>Powdery mildew</u> - Check for signs of disease on apple, crape myrtle, grape, rose, and stone fruits. <u>Powdery</u> <u>mildew</u> - If severe e.g., on crape myrtle, grape, and rose, avoid fertilization and overirrigation. Prune during the proper time of year to increase air circulation and sun exposure.

Prune deciduous trees and shrubs that need pruning e.g., apple, crape myrtle, pear, rose, spirea, and stone fruits. Make cuts properly to encourage good form and structure. Remove dead, diseased, and borer-infested wood. Except certain pests and host plants warrant summer pruning e.g., shothole borer, apricot, and cherry.

<u>Prune</u> pine terminals only during candling (new shoot growth), late spring to early summer, to retard growth and in young pines direct growth.<u>Prune</u> winter-flowering shrubs e.g., camellia before next year's flower buds form.

<u>Rose pests</u> - Manage or take preventive actions for powdery mildew, aphids, black spot, downy mildew, and rust.

•New Senate Bill 1374 defines ZONE O as the first 6 ft around your house or decks.

•Landscape as needed to achieve low density, hydrated mulched plantings.
